Odo Casel was a Benedictine monk and great theologian of the last century. Casel taught that "mystery is a sacred action in which God's saving work is made present through the rite; the congregation, by performing the rite, take part in the saving act, and thereby win salvation." Casel moved us beyond *lex orandi lex credendi* (loosely translated: praying shapes believing) to an understanding that our very participation in our acts of worship is our participation in what we commemorate. For example, Christmas is more than the birthday of Jesus; it is our participation in the mystery of salvation seen through the lens of the Incarnation.

The same is true for the liturgies of Holy Week. From the earliest days of Christianity, Palm Sunday through Easter Day has been the focal point of the Christian year. It can be a powerful and transformative week in our spiritual lives. I pray that you will make time to join us on Palm Sunday, throughout the week, and specifically on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and at the Great Vigil of Easter and on Easter morning.

I look forward to walking with you again this year the way of the Cross which is none other than the way of life and peace. With my prayers for Blessed Holy Week and Joyous Eastertide, I remain,

Rural & Migrant Ministry





Rev. Rob, Guest Preacher in Baltimore

On Sunday, March 12th, our Rector, Rob Picken, was invited to preach at historic Grace and St. Peter's Church in Baltimore as part of their annual Lenten guest preacher series. Grace and St. Peter's Church was formed in 1912 by the union of St. Peter's (1802) and Grace Church (1852). For over a century, it has been a well-established and vibrant Anglo-Catholic parish with one of the finest choirs in Baltimore. From their beginnings, the parishes were deeply connected to their communities. In the last century, Grace and St. Peter's opened their doors to Cantonese immigrants who had started a new life in Baltimore; in the late 1940s, they opened a parochial school, which was the first integrated school – public or private – in the city; and, in the 1970s and 80s, they were a place of refuge and welcome for gay people looking for a place where they could be themselves while being valued members of a church family. Today, Grace & St. Peter's retains all these essential component parts in what is among the most diverse parishes in the diocese.
