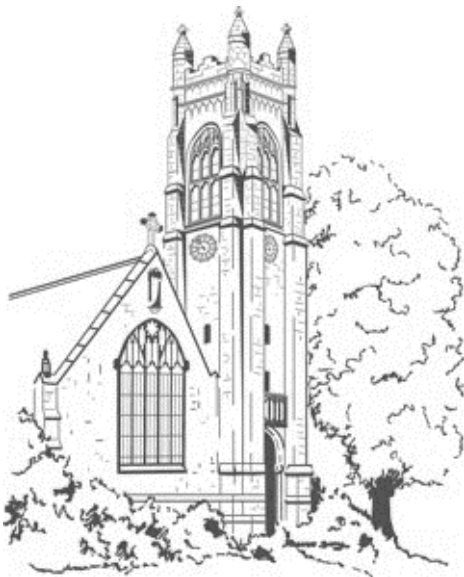

Wardens' Report

Once again, the time has come to look back and reflect on the past year at St. Paul's. While the pandemic continued to limit some aspects of parish life, we were blessed with an abundance of opportunities to renew our spirits, grow in faith and, yes, celebrate our coming together.

We began the year continuing to lean on technology in order to stay connected. We attended live streamed services and became regular attendees in the "Zoom Room" There were numerous formation opportunities as well as coffee hours where we could learn and socialize. If unsure exactly how Zoom worked, we could sign up and attend Zoom tutorials hosted by Nancy Gear

On April 18, 2021, for the first time since services went virtual in March 2020, we were able to participate in the Holy Eucharist. (We had gathered for non-Eucharistic worship during the early Fall of 2020 and on Easter.) While masked, and with only limited choir participation it was nonetheless a joyful occasion. After the service we congregated outside and enjoyed refreshments while relishing the opportunity to chat with those we had only seen on the screen for many months. Sadly, absences were keenly felt. Amid the joy was the realization that the pandemic was still with us, and those parishioners who are immunocompromised or otherwise unable to join us continued to be missed.

In June we celebrated the completion of the renovation of Stone Hall. The project known over the years as the "big dig" is now complete. The restored spaces are beautiful and thanks to the donations of many parishioners the financial burden for the completion of the project was alleviated. The youth group now has a comfortable, cheerful space in which to meet. Additionally, 12 step programs which meet at St. Paul's will appreciate the attractive, clean meeting room. Plans for additional uses for this completely refurbished space continue.

Spring led to summer and then fall. In October we celebrated the in-person visit by Bishop Singh who, on a beautiful fall day, celebrated the rites of Baptism and Confirmation. After the service there was an opportunity to get together and enjoy some fellowship in a tent set up on the lawn. The fall also saw the return of the nursery school students and the installation of the Little Free Library. The youth group, under Jay's faithful leadership, and the technical support of Bill Moore, completed the construction of the beautiful library in time for the Bishop's visit. The Little Library was blessed by Bishop Singh and now sits proudly at the entrance of the playground.

Advent and Christmas were celebrated both in-person and online. Thanks to many staff members and parishioners the church was beautifully decorated. We were able to hear the clergy preach and the choir sing, and we participated in the singing of our favorite Christmas hymns while taking part in the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ.

Outreach continued to be a large part of our mission as a church. For example, we continued to support the mission of St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, and we supported School #9 by donating gift cards at Christmas time to be distributed by school administrators to needy families. Under the leadership of Deacon Sue we assembled Kindness Kits, ready to be distributed by parishioners to anyone in need during the cold winter months in Rochester. The prayer shawl group met regularly to work and increase the supply of hand-made prayer shawls to be blessed and distributed. The concert series *If Music be the Food* to benefit Foodlink continued, in the spring, broadcast via You

Tube and then in the fall we were able to attend the event in person. We sent a donation to those living in the southern part of our diocese after floodwaters impacted the area. We continued to support projects in the Rochester area to benefit the homeless through the Tiny House project. We supported the capital campaign of the Episcopal Senior Life community. Looking back we are so grateful to realize the generosity of the members of our parish.

While many in our congregation, along with the vestry, have played an important role in shepherding St. Paul's through unprecedented times, it was Rob's skillful, faithful leadership that has allowed us to maintain our connection with each other, whether in person or electronically. Since March 2020 Rob's tireless work to remain one church, whether in person or electronically, has been truly inspirational. Jay's kind and supportive work, exemplified in so many ways, but, especially in his ministry with our youth is a blessing. Deacon Sue's work with the Outreach Committee has resulted in some new and different ways to spread the good news of St. Paul's in the community and the world. The dedication of our clergy team to St. Paul's is remarkable.

As we move into 2022 our hope and prayer is that we continue to recognize and embrace the many blessings we have. While the pandemic has been and continues to be a formidable foe, it has allowed us to prayerfully realize the resilience, flexibility, and faith of the St. Paul's church community.

Assistant Rector's Report

When I was first called to serve as Assistant Rector at St Paul's, ministry with the youth of the church was intended to be a main focus of my time here. This past year has seen us make great strides in both the resources dedicated to the youth ministry as well as the return of regular meetings!

The renovations to Stone Hall included a dedicated Youth Room from its earliest stages, and as that project finished, the Youth Group once again had a space to call their very own. Thank you to Rob, the vestry, the parents, and to all of you who contributed to the building fund for the renovations!

The youth group began the year meeting online, but were finally able to begin meeting in person at the beginning of the 2021-2022 program year.

At a meeting in late September, we finished the final touches of paint on the library and shortly afterwards, I walked into the Youth Room. It was filled with the youth lounging on the couch and chairs, laughing, eating snacks, and I was struck by how wonderful it was that all of our hopes and prayers were being realized in that snapshot.

The youth have worked on other outreach projects, continuing to meet twice each month as we continue to build our relationships and create an identity for ourselves through our fellowship. After a Spaghetti Dinner that was successful beyond our greatest hopes, we now have the seeds of a fund to continue our outreach as a Youth Group, as well as to help fund future outings and hopefully, in the years to come, mission trips.

St Paul's joined with St Thomas', Rochester and Christ Church, Downtown for confirmation classes in preparation for the bishop's visit on October 17th. This year three of our youth were confirmed, and another two youth of St Paul's have been participating in the class which has helped the young people of these congregations to learn more about and to explore their faith. We will continue together to meet through the spring of 2022.

The St Paul's Memorial Scholarship was able to award 7 scholarships this year. We also sent care packages to all recipients towards the end of their fall semester, with the Youth Group hoping to do that again in April. We hope this can be a way of continuing to be in touch with our college students even while they are away from home.

In addition to ministry with the young people of the church, there are many other ministries at St Paul's which continue to function, thrive, and even grow even as the COVID-19 pandemic continues. As we began to worship again in person, we were able to return the scheduling of readers, intercessors, and ushers to laity. Thank you to Erin Glanton, Tim Dewart, and Jennifer Bleecker for overseeing these areas of our worship. If this is a ministry you would be interested in participating in or returning to, please speak with any of them or with me.

We continue to learn new ways of living in community as many members continue to be cautious about whether to be physically present or not. One thing that has remained constant, however, is the sense of fellowship felt whether we connect in person or over the computer or phone. St Paul's remains a vibrant church which holds much promise for the years to come.

Outreach Council

The Outreach Council is the arm of the Vestry that oversees and reviews St. Paul's outreach projects and mission giving in the form of monetary support. Monetary support consists of donations to outreach applications that meet human needs both locally and worldwide as well as Vestry designated funds that support Mission Opportunities.

The Outreach Council generally meets quarterly, or as needed, to review outreach applications. Members of the council review the application and decisions on gifts are made after thoughtful discussion. Council members in 2021 were: Jan Ashley, Floyd Bayley, Tim Dewart, Kevin Frisch, Claudius Scott, Bob Shaddock, Duane Swanson, and Peg Willard. Deacon Sue Ouellette served as Clergy Liaison. Thank you to those members who completed their terms of service: Jan Ashley, Bob Shaddock, and Peg Willard.

Part of 2021 was spent doing a review of processes following the restructuring of funding sources in an effort to sustain, and even grow, the ministry of the Council. Three priorities were identified to guide funding decisions, including programs that provide housing, food ministries, and programs for youth. Outreach Gifts were awarded to: Eastern Service Workers (\$2500), American Friends of the Episcopal Church of the Sudan (\$3000), Rochester Refugee Resettlement Fund (\$3000), and Cameron Ministries (\$3000).

Welcome to those who will be joining the Council in 2022, including Jane Chapman, Mary Pietrykowski, Nancy Curtis, and David Harre. Floyd Bayley will lead the committee as its chair in 2022.

Children, Youth and Family Formation

*So that I may come to you with joy, by God's will, and in your company be refreshed.

As we are able to safely open our doors to families and children again, the joy of being together is immeasurable! It's not without bumps in the road here and there, but being ready to make adjustments and continuing to have patience and faith are key to navigating our current times.

Our nursery remains open to all baby and toddlers for our 10:15 service each week, and our care givers (Dorrie and Candace) continue their much appreciated service to our families.

We created a different class this year, with having all the children (PreK-6th) in 1 classroom. Since the children hadn't been physically together in a year and a half, having 1 room allows the kids to be reintroduced to each other and meet new friends and truly form a church family. We also welcomed 6th graders to join the class this year, since they missed their last year in person. Our main classroom is the Children's Chapel, which gives us additional space to maintain appropriate distance and also gives a great space for active games. The addition of wireless internet has allowed us to utilize faith based videos that help enhance our lessons.

Another change was starting class 15 minutes prior to the start of the service. This allows for families to bring their children up to class, sign them in and help them settle into the classroom. It also provides children the opportunity to be actively engaged in more of the church service, as they are rejoining their families a bit earlier in the service now.

We opened our year with a themed lesson plan based on the Good Samaritan for 6 weeks, which allowed children to join in person class at their families comfort level without missing entire bible lessons. After our Advent seasonal lessons, we've transitioned into a lectionary based classroom. This format gives our in person students and our at home students the ability to hear and learn the same lessons and readings as their family experiences in the church service. We also utilize the weekly children's bulletin for at home use and classroom use.

With our 45 minutes, we are able to sing, read and talk about bible passages, hear children's bible stories, play games that coincide with our lesson, color beautiful drawings and spend time in prayer. We also love to give and think of others, with activities such as card writing/drawing to fellow parishioners and collecting needed items to donate.

We've been able to bring back a few of our traditional events, and enjoyed a successful return of our Halloween party. Our youth group (grades 6-12) did a fabulous job of decorating and leading games for our younger children in our downstairs gymnasium. Families also enjoyed a Christmas party with crafts, games and gingerbread house decorating in the parish hall. Advent bags for families were sent home to all, and included an advent "wreath" (battery powered candles on round green felt) along with activities and short readings with prayer for each week. I look forward to offering similar experiences for the upcoming season of Lent and beyond.

There is much JOY to be experienced here at St. Paul's each week, and it is truly a time of connection, friendship and faith based fun for our families!

Adult Faith Formation

The year 2021 was, again, one where we gave thanks for technology. We used Zoom as our resource for most of the year as the pandemic ebbed and flowed. Below you will find a listing of the Formation programming held throughout the year, as well as a listing of our book groups.

In addition to the usual programming, we have worked this year to develop several small groups, where parishioners can come together for a purpose, but also to share their lives and faith with each other. Through the summer there was a 10-week program, following the **Ignatian Exercises** using a program developed by the Institute for Advanced Jesuit Studies at Boston College. The **Prayer Shawl Ministry** group was reinvigorated, with about twelve knitters and crocheters in the group. With others in the St. Paul's community, we created Advent and Kindness kits which were delivered, along with prayer shawls, to parishioners who are unable to join us. A group of **EfM graduates** who come together monthly to share thoughts on common readings and our stories. Look for opportunities to join a small group in the coming months.

In closing, we are grateful that we have been able to use Zoom to continue our programming through the pandemic, and are looking forward to getting back to our in-person conversations as they were in the days prior to the pandemic. I am thankful for the support of the clergy and other staff as we continue to offer learning opportunities to our parish.

Music Director's Report

It seems like yesterday that I wrote my report for 2020, a year the likes of which none of us could have imagined. Here we are, a year later, and I am writing to summarize another most interesting year: 2021. Until Easter, our schedule of Sunday services mirrored that of late fall 2020:

- a live-streamed morning service without communion, with myself and a cantor offering music (no congregation);
- through Palm Sunday we continued to offer a pre-recorded service of Evening Prayer (Compline in Lent),

Holy Week services were pre-recorded, and small groups gathered to prepare and record music for Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Finally, on Easter Day, we were permitted to have limited "in person" services, with a "quartet choir." During Easter season, this number gradually was able to be increased to 8; and when congregational singing was at long last permitted, choir members sat in the congregation to help lead hymns. It was wonderful to be inching towards something like "normal!" We were able to have communion again starting on the Third Sunday of Easter.

As the fall season approached, guidelines regarding singing were again relaxed and choirs were permitted to meet to rehearse and lead worship as before. So, from early September the St. Paul's Choir and Ringers practiced weekly and resumed their normal schedules. I spent much time sorting out distancing for rehearsals and services, to make sure everyone was comfortable with the seating arrangements. (All choir members are fully-vaxxed and boosted, and we always wear masks.) The final piece of the puzzle was our Choristers...and a stalwart group of 6 met for several weeks leading up to Christmas, singing for the 4:30 Christmas Eve service!

There are a number of other items I'd like to share about our Music Ministry in 2021:

- We welcomed **Merideth Smith** to the St. Paul's Ringers;
- we welcomed **Angie Jones** to the St. Paul's Choir, as well as new staff singers **Rey Sunglao** and **Karen Goldfeder**;
- we offered the first concert of the 13th season of "If Music Be The Food" in October,
- we, along with the Rochester Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, presented **David Baskeyfield** as organist for the 1925 silent film, "The Phantom of the Opera,"
- we offered our first Christmas-oriented Festival of Lessons and Carols on Dec. 19 (our first "extra" choral service since fall of 2019);
- we offered the **Organ Scholar** position to Ghana-native **Augustine Sobeng**. Visa interview scheduling problems prevented his joining us last fall, but this past week he obtained his visa and at long last he will be with us Jan. 30! Augustine will be a doctoral student at Eastman. And, finally,
- **an exceedingly generous parishioner** offered the wonderful gift to the choirs of specialized masks for singers that allow more and better space for breathing! (Thank you!!)

That's all for now. I continue to give thanks for the privilege of working and making music in this amazing parish! St. Paul's has the best staff and congregation anywhere...trust me on this ☺

Property Report

The Property Committee has been busy (Remotely again) this past year receiving and reviewing the proposals for building improvements and maintenance issues that come with owning such a magnificent worship space that turns 125 years old in 2022. The following is a list of items that have been completed, or are in-progress.

- Restoration of Stone Hall (once known as the Spanish Chapel) was completed in the spring of 2021. It is now the home of our youth group, ASL ministry, archives and, 7- 12 Step groups.
- We contracted with Davey Tree to prune all of our trees of dead wood.
- The sanctuary floor restoration between the Chancel steps and pews has begun and will be completed soon. There were a few repairs that were made to the subfloor but, overall, it was in good condition for being 125 years old.
- The flat roof over the Macomber room (Bride's room) has been replaced. The Vestry approved the roof replacement in 2019.
- Vestry approved to contract with, Pike Stained Glass Company, to clean and make repairs to the stained-glass windows in the Chantry. This project will take approximately 3 months.
- Repairs were made to both boilers.
- We are currently researching LED retrofit lighting options for the sanctuary.
- Thank you to our Property Committee members: Nan Brown, Bob Frank, Grace Henshaw, Doug Kelley, Ed Rubel and Al Zenner (Vestry Liaison).
- I would also like to thank Dave McEntee and Jim D'Angelo for all the help they have given me in overseeing the various projects and maintenance of our buildings.
