A Message from our Rector

Dear Friends,

In his poem "The Journey of the Magi," T.S. Eliot gives voice to the memory of one of the Magi who 'traversed afar' to visit the newborn Jesus. This *Magus* recalls returning home – "to [his] old dispensation" – "no longer at ease" with the life he had been living.

We again went to the manger like the shepherds and joined the song of the angels during Christmas. I am grateful to all who made our celebrations possible; what a joy it was to be together in-person this year and to be joined via live-stream with people from Long Island to Nashville to Orlando and beyond. Each Christmas, we are reminded that the Eternal Word, who was "in the beginning," was

made flesh in Jesus: God incarnate, man Divine. And each year, as I take down my decorations and stop playing my favorite Christmas music, I wonder: what difference has all this made?

Will the giving of gifts make me more generous with those in need all year? Will preaching about the God's Love being made *real* in Jesus make me more likely to "enflesh" God's love in my interactions with others? Will hearing of the slaughter of the Holy Innocents by King Herod in an attempt to kill Jesus make me look more compassionately at children who are refugees or in poverty? Will the joy and gratefulness I felt being around parishioners, family, and friends this season carry on? In other words, like T.S. Eliot's wise man, will my life of faith be emboldened and made new again by this encounter with the Christ Child? ... I hope so.

During Advent, parishioners met in person or online between Sunday services about four principles of Christian living:


On Advent 1 – Baptism, led by the Rev. Rob Picken,

Nancy Grear handled the technology to support hybrid meetings for those who preferred to participate from home.




Late January – February: Lenten Old Testament Readings

Needs continue at St. Joseph's House

On December 18, I delivered some additional coats, gloves, underwear, and two pairs of work boots. One pair of boots was size 9 ½ for Junior who helps our St. Paul's Group when we help out at St. Joseph's on first Saturdays of the month. His partner passed away last year, but he is always positive. On December 18, Junior and Harry (who runs the shelter on Saturday) helped me unload. I told Junior I found a pair of boots for him and he cried. Harry and I had given Junior a coat and gloves two weeks prior. A second gentleman approached and asked if he could have a pair of boots. When I said that the pair left was a size 12, he showed me how he normally wears an 11, but wears a 12 due to swelling in his left foot. When he saw Harry and me unloading coats, and he asked for a coat which we gave him. He said thank you, and that God has blessed him with what our church is doing. I had also taken 29 pairs of gloves. Harry asked if he could wrap those gloves and give them to the

CANDIDATE FOR WARDEN (2 year term)

ERIN GLANTON found her spiritual home at St. Paul's and was received here thirty-five years ago. She finds the inclusiveness of the Episcopal Church and specifically of St. Paul's to be central to her faith journey. Erin currently serves on the Vestry and the Human Resources Committee for St. Paul's. Erin completed Education for Ministry (EFM) earlier this year, attended the College for Congregational Development during the summer, and participates in St. Paul's book groups, adult formation, and the prayer shawl ministry. She coordinates the 10:15 lectors and has sung in the Senior Choir at St. Paul's for the last 33 years. Erin and Al, her husband, live in Brighton. She retired three years ago as the Human Resources Director at Coordinated Care Services, Inc. (CCSI), a not-for-profit organization providing services to the behavioral health and human services community. Erin holds a Masters degree in Human Resource Development from St. John Fisher College. Erin serves on the Board of St. Paul's Child Care Center and on the Human Resources Committee for Family Promise of Greater Rochester (formerly RAIHN). She is honored to be nominated for the position of warden.

CANDIDATES FOR VESTRY (3-year terms)



KEVIN FRISCH has attended St. Paul's since April 2010, where he immediately joined the Choir and has been singing in the choir every year since. He has also been a LEM and a Lector for many years, and enjoys doing both. He is a regular volunteer for RAIHN, plus served on the Stewardship committee for 5 years. Kevin worked at Kodak, then transferred to Carestream Health, where he as worked the last 34 years in Information Technology. He is also a member of the LGBT Giving Circle, a philanthropic group with the Rochester Area Community Foundation, and has been the Membership co-chair for the last few years. Kevin has three adult children and five grandchildren. Kevin is honored to be nominated to be a part of the Vestry.



JULIE GEDRO, MBA, SHRM-SCP, Ed.D., is the Dean of the School of Business at SUNY Empire State College. She holds a B.A. in Economics and English from the College of William and Mary, an M.B.A. in Business Information Systems from Kennesaw State University, and a Doctorate of Education in Adult Education and Human Resource Development from the University of Georgia. Dr. Gedro is the author of two books: Lipstick or Golf Clubs: What Lesbian Leaders Understand About Success (2014) and Identity, Meaning and Subjectivity in Career Development (2017). Her third book project (with Co-Editor Dr. Tonette S. Rocco, Professor at Florida International University) is the Routledge Handbook of LGBTQ Identity in Organizations and Society (expected publication late 2023). Julie completed the four-year Education for Ministry Program offered at St. Paul's in May 2021. She has served a first term on our Vestry (Class of 2021). She sings in the Choir, serves on the Human Resources, Finance, and Stewardship Committees. She has completed the first year of the College for Congregational Development in July 2021 at Notre Dame Retreat Center. A former Roman Catholic, she took the formation course to be received in the Episcopal faith at St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Atlanta, Georgia on May 3, 1998.



BRENT JOHNSON, his wife Anita, and son Leif, moved to Rochester from Atlanta in 2014 and began attending St. Paul's Episcopal Church in 2016. Brent began singing in the church choir in 2017 and was elected to the Vestry for a 3-year term beginning January 2019. He occasionally served as usher at Sunday morning services and for funerals. In September 2021, he began serving as board president for St. Paul's Childcare Center and was board treasurer the year before. Prior to March 2020, Leif was a regular attendee of St. Paul's Sunday School and he recently returned to Sunday School in September 2021; now, he also attends St. Paul's Youth Group gatherings with Father Jay and friends. Leif sings in the St. Paul's Choristers under Dr. Poovey and has, on occasion, given musical offerings during the worship service. Brent is Professor of Biostatistics and Computational Biology at the University of Rochester. His hobbies include cooking, fishing, bike riding and cross-country skiing.

ANNUAL MEETING RATIFICATION SOUGHT

During its December meeting, the Vestry unanimously referred a resolution for ratification to the upcoming Annual Parish Meeting. If adopted, this resolution would reduce the Vestry, in accordance with New York State religious incorporation law, from 12 elected members plus 2 elected wardens, an appointed clerk and treasurer, to 9 members plus 2 wardens, a clerk, and a treasurer.

Regular reviews of governance structure are healthy and appropriate in organizations. Beginning with conversations by the Nominating Committee in November 2020, many discussions have been held about the composition and size of the Vestry. The Vestry has discussed this matter at least three times, including during their Fall workday. The matter was also discussed with this year's Nominating Committee and with some recent past leadership. A review was conducted of parishes similar to ours both within and without our diocese and this change is very much in line with what was learned.

Our Vestry members and Wardens are active in many different facets of the life of this congregation and represent the voice of the congregation quite well. This amendment emphasizes mission over governance. Rather than time spent in business meetings, our parishioners can share their finite gift of time in serving on committees or in ministries where their gifts and talents would be better used.

Lastly, the timing for this change is opportune. There is already a vacancy on the Vestry and a member who is not eligible to run again. With the nomination of a Vestry member to serve as Warden, we are able to reduce by the three members without impacting terms or carrying this change out over a few years.

A Greening of the Church Thank You


The Christmas celebration seemed even more special this year as we were once again all together, as opposed to last year, to "green" our church.
